Vancouver General Hospital

UBC Hospital

UBC Hospital offers specialized treatment for non-life-threatening emergencies and surgical care. Programs and services at UBC Hospital include urgent care, short-stay day surgery, diagnostic imaging services, extended care, bladder care, brain research, Sleep Disorders and a range of neurology clinics.

GF Strong Rehab Centre

GF Strong is the largest and most specialized rehabilitation centre for people in BC and the Yukon who have suffered spinal cord or brain injuries. Here, a renowned team of health care professionals deliver individually tailored care and treatment in five unique programs: Acquired Brain Injury, Spinal Cord Injury, Arthritis, Neuromusculoskeletal and Adolescent and Young Adult.

Vancouver Community Health Services

Community Health Services is a division of Vancouver Coastal Health that delivers multifaceted health care to Vancouverites in their neighbourhoods. The Future of Surgery...an Inspired Surgical Vision

Celebrity chef Umberto Menghi is known the world over for his unbridled enthusiasm for great food and his commitment to preserving Tuscan culture and cuisine. His youthful energy is contagious and there is very little that slows him down. But an old skiing injury combined with long hours standing in kitchens around the world had taken a toll. Umberto needed a knee replacement. Impatient to get it done, he sought private care in the US. That's when he was told by doctors in Arizona and Seattle hospitals that the best place to get it done was right here in his own backyard with Vancouver Coastal Health's (VCH) orthopaedic surgeon Dr. Bas Masri.

World-class health care is vital to British Columbians. It's precisely why we are embarking on the Future of Surgery, an ambitious multi-year initiative that will enable VGH to focus on the most complex surgery cases – such as traumas, transplants and complex cancer surgeries – with scheduled operations such as knee replacements like Umberto's being performed at UBC Hospital.

Phase 1 of the VGH project includes 16 new state-of-the-art operating rooms (ORs) and a special 'hybrid' operating room built to accommodate complex surgeries. In tandem, a renewal at UBC Hospital will transform the hospital into a hub for scheduled surgeries to enhance efficiency, and most importantly, improve patient outcomes. The two hospitals will work together to maximize efficiencies and reduce surgery rescheduling.

"Forty-five percent of our surgeries are unscheduled," says Dr. Masri. "For many of our patients, that means their scheduled surgeries need to be rebooked, sometimes at the last minute. Not only will we gain a tremendous amount of capacity and flexibility to improve patient care, the new ORs will also accommodate up-to-date technology and equipment."

Together, VGH and UBC Hospital perform more than 30,000 surgeries every year.

Complicating matters, the operating rooms at VGH – the first accredited Level 1 trauma centre in the province – were built over 30 years ago. They are not standardized and can no longer meet the demands placed on them.

"We're building for the future," says Dr. Masri.
"We're the only medical centre in the province
for referrals and complex surgical cases.
These improvements to our ORs will continue
to position us as world leaders in clinical
teaching and research."



Creating the first interventional, or 'hybrid' operating room at VGH is one of the campaign's first initiatives. This special operating room includes its own state-of-the-art imaging equipment, which means that patients do not have to be moved to another location for imaging during surgery. This saves precious time – and has proven to save lives.

Thanks to the philanthropic leadership of the Leon Judah Blackmore Foundation and donors like the Angus and Margaret Reid Family Foundation, Bob and Lily Lee, Alice Chung, John Tognetti, Jason and Emily Ko (Viva Pharmaceutical), Ian Gillespie (Westbank) and the Vascular, Trauma and Cardiovascular Surgeons at VGH, the new hybrid operating room is fully funded and expected to open Fall 2016.

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



A group of physicians are so committed to improving the health of their patients that they collectively donated \$140,000 towards a new Interventional or "Hybrid" Operating Room (OR). Their donation joins the many donors who together have raised over \$8 million towards the new operating facility.

The facility, which opens in November 2016 at VGH, is a one-stop innovative surgery space that includes its own state-of-the-art imaging equipment where surgeons will no longer

have to move patients to another location during surgery for imaging. The Hybrid OR complements the expertise of VGH's vascular, trauma and cardiovascular surgeons by putting the most advanced tools at their fingertips.

Breathing Life Into Lung Cancer Detection

Any cancer is scary, but lung cancer is a particularly insidious disease — symptoms typically don't occur until the cancer has spread. Because of this, the five-year survival rate is less than 18%. It's not hard to imagine how many lives could be saved through an early detection screening program.

JASON AND EMILY KO DONATED \$1.2M TO SUPPORT A LUNG CANCER SCREENING PILOT PROGRAM AT VGH.

That was the inspiration behind a \$1.2 million gift from philanthropists Emily and Jason Ko. Their transformational gift supports a Lung Cancer Screening Pilot Program at VGH. The pilot program pioneers a new model for lung cancer screening for British Columbians and is the first large scale pilot project of its kind in North America. The program hopes to lead to changes in clinical care and the formation of public policy in lung cancer screening and early detection.

For Jason, a well-known business leader from Taiwan, this issue hits close to home. His wife, Emily, was a thoracic surgery Head Nurse and has seen first-hand the devastating effects of lung cancer, particularly in patients who had never smoked. This was one of the reasons why Jason and his family felt so compelled to act. "Lung cancer has affected many of my friends who are non-smokers and this was

our way of helping save lives so that others can receive care earlier," says Jason, who was inspired by the spirit of giving from his late mother. As successful immigrants, the Kos believe that their legacy is in sharing their wealth with the community and giving back to help others, a philosophy that they share with their family and employees at their company Viva Pharmaceutical.

Like other cancers, early detection can mean the difference between a treatable disease or palliative care. "We know that low-dose CT scans help diagnose lung cancer at an earlier stage and can reduce lung cancer mortality by up to 20%," says Dr. John Yee, Head of Thoracic Surgery at VGH and Director of the BC Lung Transplant Program. "There's no question that our ability to detect lung cancer earlier will have a tremendous impact on people's health."



The screening program will enroll 2,000 highrisk individuals over a three-year period with a two-year follow-up. The study is international in scope and examines the value of inclusion of air pollution exposures for risk assessment. It also applies advanced computer technology with the goal of improving efficiency and accuracy of reading large number of screening CT scans, as well as decreasing unnecessary imaging studies or biopsies. The results are expected to help drive the development of a province-wide screening program and will contribute to the medical research community across Canada and globally, noted Dr. Stephen Lam, a specialist in lung cancer and co-leader of the Lung Cancer Screening Program.

With more than 1.6 million people worldwide dying each year from lung cancer, the impact of the Ko family's generosity in funding this important screening program is truly global.

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

Innovative Microscope Aids Researchers in Preventing Ovarian Cancer



"The LCM enables us to look for the genetic changes in individual or small numbers of cells that mark the beginning of cancer. We believe that understanding how cancer starts will lead to better prevention and treatment strategies. In our research the system is critical in determining whether we can use mutations as screening tools for ovarian cancer and when a woman should be considered at increased risk." DR. DAVID HUNTSMAN, CO-DIRECTOR, OVCARE, VGH, BCCA

Researchers with the Ovarian Cancer Research (OVCARE) program are using an innovative microscope to unravel the genetic changes that give rise to ovarian cancers and pinpoint when in the development of these cancers they begin to change and become dangerous.

The laser capture microdissection (LCM) system allows OVCARE researchers to capitalize on the team's genomic prowess and helps accelerate the world leading ovarian cancer prevention program developed by VGH surgeon Dr. Dianne Miller. Much of this research requires the study of precursor lesions, which is difficult with standard techniques as these lesions are extremely small. The state-of-the art microscope enables the team to effectively isolate the cells of

interest from the remaining cells in the tissue sample. This was an impossible task until the LCM was created.

More than 2,500 Canadian women are diagnosed with ovarian cancer annually; more than 1,700 die because of it. The LCM also benefits pancreatic cancer researchers to access molecular markers in bloodstreams, bypassing the need for surgical study. Understanding these lesions is key to developing a preventative approach.

New Research Aims to Increase Pancreatic Cancer **Survival Rates**

Pancreatic cancer is one of the deadliest cancers, affecting 1 in 79 Canadians with an average 6% survival rate. This year alone, 600 British Columbians will be diagnosed with pancreatic cancer and an estimated 400 will die from the disease. Pancreas Centre BC is dedicated to increasing survival rates by pursuing innovative ways of screening, treating and preventing pancreatic cancer.

Thanks to the generous support of an anonymous donor, the Centre has launched a new initiative: Metastatic Pancreatic Cancer Biobank and Genetic Evaluation Program for patients with advanced pancreatic cancer.

The goal behind this research project is to develop a simple blood test that could detect pancreatic cancer early enough to find effective targeted therapies so that more lives can be saved.

Through a partnership with VGH, UBC, BC Cancer Agency and Vancouver Coastal Health Research Institute, Pancreas Centre BC draws together world-class clinical, scientific and multi-disciplinary leaders to advance pancreatic cancer care and research.

The Heartbeat of Cardiac Care

Cardiac rhythm disorders are a major cause of illness and death in BC, and the demand for treatment is growing as our population ages. Businessman, philanthropist and VGH & UBC Hospital Foundation board member Ben Yeung had a first-hand account of this perspective when his father Peter, the founder of Peterson, sought dedicated care from some of BC's most talented cardiologists.

DR. MATT BENNETT PERFORMS MINIMALLY INVASIVE HEART PROCEDURES THAT ALLOW PATIENTS TO QUICKLY RECOVER.

"My father believed in the value of working together and showing gratitude to those who helped us through life," reflected Ben. Peterson, the company his father founded and of which Ben is Executive Chair & Chief Executive Officer, hosted the Rhythm of the Heart dinner in February 2016 to highlight the need for the Cardiac Electrophysiology (EP) Program. During the event, Ben announced Peterson's gift of \$3 million in support of the expansion and enhancement of cardiac care in Vancouver. Additional donations made at the Rhythm of the Heart dinner have resulted in a total of over \$4.4 million raised to date.

EP is the part of cardiology dedicated to the heart's electrical system. It makes use of medicines as well as advanced technology to help individuals regain control of their heart. The procedures performed by electrophysiologists are minimally invasive, allowing patients to quickly recover and get back to their lives sooner. Ben developed a keen interest in the need for an upgraded and expanded Cardiac EP Program in Vancouver, particularly after a tour of the EP site at VGH highlighted what needed to be addressed to improve patient care.

VGH currently has three heart catheterization laboratories ("cath labs") where more than 5,000 cardiac procedures are carried out annually. Inside the cath labs, blocked arteries are opened, blood flow is restored and ultimately lives are saved. A dedicated EP lab and an additional cath lab would meet the increased need for more complex procedures, specialized equipment and longer intervention times.

"The treatment of cardiac arrhythmias is a continually evolving field," says Dr. Jason Andrade, a cardiac electrophysiologist at VGH. "In the past patients with arrhythmias were stuck with ineffective medications or invasive open heart surgery to treat their heart rhythm disorder. In recent years the field has advanced through the use of innovative and less invasive procedures so that patients can recover and return to their everyday lives sooner. There is currently a significant need for state-of-the art equipment to aid in the diagnosis and treatment of heart rhythm disorders, as well as a need to increase our capacity to perform these complicated procedures as efficiently as possible."



The dedicated cardiac EP lab will contain the most advanced ablation technology available, as well as enhanced imaging and mapping technologies (fluoroscopic, 3D and a GPS mapping system) in order to precisely localize the source of the heart rhythm disorder. This new equipment will also reduce patient and staff exposure to radiation by over half.

"After touring the shared EP/cath lab site at VGH, it was clear to me that these needs must be addressed to maintain and improve patient care and attract and retain the best and brightest minds in cardiology," said Ben.

Thanks to the generosity of Peterson and Ben's special friends and colleagues, a dedicated EP lab at VGH will soon be a reality, a fitting way to honour his father's memory and to ensure future patients will benefit from the best possible care for years to come.

A wing of the tuberculosis (TB) ward at VGH has been renamed in honour of the many contributions made by the TB Vets Charitable Foundation. A longstanding and valued donor for more than 25 years, TB Vets has purchased equipment that assists in the diagnosis of lung conditions, and has provided vital support for TB research to help improve treatment for patients. Typically attacking the lungs, TB is a highly contagious disease that affects more than 300 BC citizens annually with the highest risk groups being foreign-born

Canadians, the Aboriginal population and the socially marginalized. VGH operates the only TB Unit in the province where patients go for specialized care and treatment.

The TB Vets Charitable Foundation is dedicated to funding innovative research and recreation therapy programs that improve the health and quality of life for those suffering from TB and other respiratory diseases.

Revolutionary Non-Invasive

Heart Surgery

Thanks to two renowned surgeons, BC has become a global leader in heart valve innovation. Structural and interventional cardiologists Dr. David Wood of VGH and Dr. John Webb of St. Paul's Hospital helped pioneer transcatheter aortic valve replacement (TAVR) – an alternative to open heart surgery utilizing minimally invasive heart valve technology.

Currently, it is available only to select highrisk patients. Before it can be come more broadly accessible, comprehensive clinical research must be done. Dr. Wood and a Vancouver-based team are leading a multicentre national research study of TAVR called 3M – multidisciplinary, multimodality, minimalist. The study looks at select patients who are awake when they undergo TAVR, are typically walking four hours later, and are safely discharged home the following day. Results from the research study will be used to determine whether this procedure is applicable to others beyond high-risk.

Treating Disease from the Inside Out

Imagine killing cancer through a small needle without surgery or restoring blood flow to critical organs or limbs. It's quite likely that this is all in a day's work for interventional radiologist Dr. Stephen Ho and his team at VGH thanks to a new angiography suite funded by the generosity of philanthropic leaders Sonny and Florence Leong.

SONNY AND FLORENCE LEONG, WITH DR. STEPHEN HO, BELIEVE IN GIVING BACK TO HELP ADVANCE PATIENT CARE IN BC.

The Leongs have a long history of being involved in the health care field – Sonny was a pharmacist, Florence was a nurse, and they have many family members who are in the medical profession. It's no surprise that their donation is centered on giving back to the community of patient care. "To us, giving back to society is the right thing to do, especially to health care," says Sonny. "Canada has treated us very well and has given us many opportunities – we can all contribute."

Angiography is an advanced x-ray system that takes exceptional anatomical images. The Leongs' donation includes the purchase of a special, highly complex piece of equipment for the renovated angiography suite that will put the latest technology upgrades into the skilled hands of specialists and ensure that British Columbians suffering from stroke, vascular disease, aneurysms, cancer and other complex conditions receive the best health care possible.

New imaging technology and interventional devices over the past 20 years has greatly increased the number of medical conditions

that may now be treated using interventional radiology. Traditionally, interventional radiology has been performed through a puncture through the groin. Recovery meant lying flat for several hours, an inconvenient and sometimes uncomfortable process for patients. Advances in technology will now allow many of these procedures to be performed through a puncture in the wrist. Recovery time is much shorter and more comfortable.

Today, many conditions that once required surgery can be treated non-surgically by interventional radiologists like Dr. Ho. Interventional radiology uses the body's natural pathways – the arteries and veins – to thread catheters to an area anywhere in the body that is diseased, including cancers that cannot be removed surgically. It's a remarkable, minimally invasive procedure that allows patients to return to their lives with very little interruption.



"The new angiography suite means we're equipped for greater precision and improved patient outcomes," says Dr. Ho. "And now that we're getting close to building our new suite, we've had interest from medical institutions around the world wanting to come here to learn about our work. It's a fantastic opportunity to continue to showcase the outstanding work that we do."

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

New Centre to **Empower Women**With Vulvar Disease

A new health centre focused on vulvar diseases will be a welcome relief to female patients who have often had to seek help from multiple health care providers such as family doctors, gynecologists, dermatologists and others in an attempt to find an accurate diagnosis. More than 1,500 appointments are made annually at specialty clinics in BC for women with vulvar diseases and 20% of women will have significant vulvar symptoms during their lifetime.

The new BC Centre for Vulvar Health, located in the Gordon and Leslie Diamond Health Care Centre, aims to provide national and international leadership in health care

education and research for those afflicted with vulvar conditions. Patients can expect a holistic approach to assessment and treatment services with multidisciplinary experts on site. Long-term goals of the Centre include an active research program and online services to provide access to physicians for women who reside in remote communities province-wide.

Back in the Driver's Seat

With clients to meet, contracts to close, and a business to run, self-employed Michael Drechsler is determined to get back behind the wheel. "Yes, I'm living with multiple sclerosis," says Michael, "but I'll be darned if I'm going to let it stop me from driving."

It's a different story for Adrian Jones*. Even though he's had his own set of wheels since the age of three, seventeen-year-old Adrian can't wait to learn how to drive. Adrian uses a wheelchair because he has cerebral palsy. Moving his legs is slow and challenging, which means he is unable to use traditional gas and brake pedals.

Michael and Adrian have hurdles to driving, but they are not insurmountable ones. Both will soon be testing their driving skills behind the wheel of a fully equipped and adaptable minivan as part of the Driver Rehabilitation Program at GF Strong. "The Program is lifechanging for patients who wish to drive or return to driving," notes an enthusiastic Lisa Kristalovich, Occupational Therapist for the Driving Program. "In Michael's case, not being able to drive has limited his work capacity and ability to easily and efficiently get around

the city. We are enormously grateful to ICBC for its generosity in helping us purchase this specially modified, wheelchair-accessible training vehicle."

ICBC funded the purchase and modification of the van through its Community Involvement Program, which provides injury recovery and road safety grants to community organizations. "The van will accommodate the unique needs of drivers with a range of physical impairments," says Steve Crombie, ICBC's VP, Corporate & Stakeholder Governance. "We are proud to help these individuals develop or re-learn the skills that will get them on the road, whether they're experienced or getting their license for the first time."

The new minivan – one of only two in BC – has 10 different kinds of hand controls as well as many other modifications. The van can be customized to accommodate each client's abilities and needs which allows the GF Strong Driver Rehab Program to provide assessment and training for participants with physical, cognitive or visual disabilities.

"People with mobility issues want to walk and drive again," says Lisa. "They want freedom and independence. This Program not only helps give them that opportunity, but it improves their physical and mental health, and reduces the stress on caregivers."

Next on Lisa and GF Strong's wish list is a modified car that will provide a similar range of equipment in a car for a better client-equipment fit and decrease dependency on third party driver instructors.

A unique space in Vancouver has become an artistic haven for youth and adults with mental illnesses. The Art Studios is a creative sanctuary where clients can access the creative arts to improve well-being, recover, and participate in society. Having on-site occupational therapists and peer support workers also provides support services in assessment, care coordination and mental status monitoring.

The Art Studios has served more than 500 clients since 2012. Inspired by the dedicated commitment of the Art Studios' staff and volunteers, Risa and Bill Levine have generously donated to support the program over the last four years. "We are proud to see

this 'little service that could' thrive in such a positive way in the community," says Risa. 'What this program can do for clients and their well-being is a gift."

Indeed, clients not only responded positively in this environment but made gains in recovery and integration to society based on the results of an impact study funded by VGH & UBC Hospital Foundation. Many of the clients continue with the program as volunteers or instructors and several have extended their artistic endeavors to the community, creating art exhibitions or setting up their own studios.

Mobile Device Delivers Liver Disease

Screening in Communities


Detecting the onset of liver disease complications has been made easier with the use of a mobile screening device. The FibroScan machine, equipped with a specialized XL probe, is used by Primary Care Teams in Vancouver to provide comprehensive liver assessments and faster access to Hepatitis C treatment for patients who may otherwise develop chronic infections for liver diseases such as cirrhosis and cancer.

More than 60,000 people in BC live with Hepatitis C and more than 100 die from the disease annually. In BC, 80% of new diagnoses are people who use intravenous drugs. Engaging with this vulnerable group of individuals directly in their community reduces the possibility of the development of more serious health complications. The recently acquired XL probe attachment enables a full scope of FibroScan services allowing community treatment teams to provide services to all individuals regardless of age, stature or condition.


Young people aged 12-19 come to GF Strong's AYA Program with post-traumatic, acquired or inherited disabilities, including brain or spinal

Freestyle Skier Makes Miraculous Recovery from Brain Injury

Jamie Crane-Mauzy of Park City, Utah, was one of the world's top freestyle skiers with her sights set on the Winter Olympics. But in April 2015, while competing in Whistler, Jamie suffered a traumatic brain injury after a horrific crash. Jamie stopped breathing and had to be resuscitated on the mountain. She was airlifted to VGH, where doctors working in critical care medicine saved her life using innovative treatment and technology only made possible through donor support.

Dr. Myp Sekhon, the ICU physician on call that night, remembers the 23-year-old when she was wheeled into the ICU. "She was completely unconscious, in a coma, and showed devastating signs of severe brain injury," says Dr. Sekhon. "She needed emergency surgery. Based on our traditional diagnostic models and available therapies, her chance at a full recovery was slim."

VGH neurosurgeons and Dr. Sekhon used a revolutionary procedure that night – one of the first times it had been attempted in North America. They placed special brain catheters into Jamie's brain. The information provided allowed them to manipulate Jamie's blood pressure so that her brain received the exact amount of oxygen it needed to heal and recover.

Dr. Sekhon and his colleague, Dr. Don Griesdale, had learned this autoregulation monitoring procedure while studying traumatic brain injury at Addenbrooke's Hospital at the University of Cambridge. Both doctors have since established a close and ongoing collaboration with their neurocritical care colleagues at Addenbrooke. "We rely heavily on their clinical expertise with traumatic brain injuries," says Dr. Sekhon. "We are now actively coinvestigating how these brain monitors can help brain injury after cardiac arrest."



Dr. Sekhon and his critical care colleagues are immensely grateful to Linda Nimmerrichter Holmes and her husband, Eric, who helped fund the monitor that helped save Jamie's life.


Jamie made a full recovery. She is back skiing for fun and taking life one day at a time. "I owe my complete recovery to all the ICU doctors, nurses and medical staff who took amazing care of me", says Jamie. "I especially owe my family. They never stopped working to help me recover." Her biggest goal now is to help inspire other people to set goals and work towards them.

A Vital New Service

Thanks to donors Norm and Pat Francis, the Hydrocephalus Clinic at VGH has been established to improve patient care. Hydrocephalus is a condition in which abnormal fluid accumulates in the brain, causing pressure that enlarges the head and sometimes causes brain damage. Led by neurosurgeons Dr. Brian Toyota and Dr. Thomas Zwimpfer, the multi-disciplinary Clinic cares for adult hydrocephalus patients, with the goal of providing ongoing care to reduce unnecessary emergency room visits.

Currently, there are 55 active patients and referrals continue to come from family physicians, neurologists and geriatricians across the province.

The Francis' donation will enable the recruitment of dedicated clinic staff, a nurse practitioner, and a physician.

The next milestone for the Clinic is to create new resource materials to empower patients and build knowledge and advocacy. The team is excited about exploring partnerships to strengthen the transition between pediatric and adult care.

To honour Lily's memory, the Kong family provided a generous donation of \$400,000 to establish the Lily Kong Legacy Fund. This endowment fund will help support education, clinical care and research into Myasthenia Gravis with the aim of improving outcomes for patients and their families who live with the disease.

BC BUDDHIST FESTIVAL

The annual BC Buddhist Festival, hosted by the Tsengdok Monastery, celebrates the diverse cultures that shape Buddhism in BC. A total of \$10,000 from event proceeds was donated to VGH's Palliative Care Unit.

HAVE A HEALTHY HEART FUNDRAISER

The 19th annual fundraiser raised over \$69,000 for the VGH Centre for Cardiovascular Health. Funds raised help support educational and exercise programs at the Centre to keep clients well-informed on ways to prevent and manage cardiovascular disease.

urgent needs

Your donations to the Most Urgent Needs Fund help support our hospitals' most critical needs, including the equipment and ground breaking research required to advance patient treatment and care.

In fiscal 2015-16, we funded over 140 pieces of medical technology – equipment such as electrocardiograph machines, defibrillators, bladder scanners and wheelchairs for various areas across our hospitals and health care centres in the community.

In addition to critical equipment, we supported eight new researchers this year who are studying a variety of health issues – from investigating ways to develop better treatment for people suffering from concussions, to exploring ways to improve sleep in order to promote cognitive function in older adults.

Programs that help fund our most urgent needs are:

LOTTERIES

Last year, Millionaire Lottery and Hometown Heroes Lottery raised more than \$4.4 million. One hundred percent of net ticket proceeds go toward funding urgently needed equipment and research at our hospitals and community health care centres. Since 1996, these two lotteries have raised over \$56 million to purchase innovative equipment, including ventilators, MRIs and CT scanners.



SIGNATURE EVENTS

Every year, our signature events continue to draw together generous donors and volunteers who have helped us raise record revenues for our hospitals' critical needs.

Last year, our Night of a Thousand Stars and De Beers Time to Shine galas raised a record-breaking \$5 million to help fund a new Interventional (Hybrid) Operating Room at VGH. Additionally, our Mr. Lube Tournament for Life remains one of the largest annual revenue sources dedicated to advancing prostate cancer care and research at the Vancouver Prostate Centre.

ANGEL CAMPAIGN

More than 2,100 donors helped us raise nearly \$370,000 last year in our Angel campaign. Since 2001, this special holiday annual campaign has raised more than \$2.1 million for the Most Urgent Needs Fund. Through the campaign, individuals are able to recognize the health care providers who have touched them, by giving a donation with a personalized message written on an angel ornament that is hung in the winter wonderland of holiday trees at VGH, and the Gordon and Leslie Diamond Health Care Centre.

Garry Walker was so weak he couldn't climb the stairs from his building's parking garage to his office any more. "For someone who has always been active, I was terrified about what this sudden change in my health could mean. I decided to see my family doctor, Dr. John Mail, right away."

Under Dr. Mail's care and his invaluable guidance, Garry's fears were realized when he was diagnosed with aplastic anemia – a rare blood disorder in which his body's bone marrow wasn't creating enough new blood cells. Garry was quickly admitted to VGH and quarantined for six days in the bone marrow transplant unit. "These were six of the most harrowing days of my life", says Garry. "Only my doctors and my wife, Pat, could visit. I was so sick from the medications and tests, and all I wanted was to get better and go home." Happily, Garry's story ended well. "Thanks to the incredible doctors, nurses and medical staff, and my wife's love and support, I'm walking and lifting weights again. The hospital saved my life."

Inspired by the need to give back, Garry and Pat reached out to VGH & UBC Hospital Foundation. They decided to help support the future of the Hospital by including a gift in their will to the Foundation. 


