# The Future of Surgery is here

Ritchie Biln was 30 years old when his life changed forever. The experienced backcountry snowmobiler was out for a ride near Squamish when the snow underneath him gave way. He crashed down 30 feet, cracking his back on a metal bracket of his snowmobile. He couldn't move.

At VGH, Ritchie underwent several MRIs which showed the impact of the fall had shattered his vertebrae and bone fragments were embedded in his spinal cord. Orthopaedic Spine Surgeon Dr. Brian Kwon assessed that Ritchie would need surgery to remove the bone fragments and realign his spine.

"It was very severe," says Dr. Kwon. "With that kind of injury we were very concerned about the potential that there wouldn't be any function from the waist down."

Ritchie's future was in his hands.

# The Future of Surgery is saving families

Dr. Kwon led Ritchie's complex five-hour surgery, methodically removing bone fragments, and decompressing and realigning his spine. After the delicate and painstaking procedure, Ritchie's spine was repaired with no lasting damage.

Ritchie and his partner Kristen have since married and welcomed their first child into their lives. They have come out of the experience with a renewed sense of life and an appreciation for the expert medical care available at VGH.

"Things can happen at any time. And in the unfortunate circumstances it does, the donations that support state-of-the-art equipment, the best services and the most amazing staff will make all the difference to your care, treatment, recovery and outcome," says Kristen.

VGH is the only site in BC for lung, liver and pancreas transplants. In 2018, VGH performed 50% of all organ transplants in the province, including 50 double lung transplants.



## Revolutionizing brain care

Intensive care physicians Drs. Myp Sekhon and Don Griesdale, and Neurosurgeon Dr. Peter Gooderham are, without a doubt, revolutionaries of medicine.

What started as a fellowship training opportunity at the University of Cambridge has transformed the trio of physicians into world leaders in their field.

"What we learned there about brain monitoring procedures has shaped the Neurocritical Care (NCC) program at VGH, a joint collaborative effort between the Divisions of Critical Care and Neurosurgery," says Dr. Sekhon.

"The technology itself is very exciting. However, life-saving results are only achieved when the information is interpreted and applied by the multidisciplinary and expert team caring for the patient. This is what is truly making our new NCC program a success."

The innovative Neurocritical Care program at VGH is saving lives and improving the chances of recovery. The odds of regaining full brain function following a traumatic brain injury used to be 37%. Now, the recovery rate is 60%.

This medical revolution was only made possible because of philanthropy. Seeing firsthand the lives saved and the families reunited, the staff of the NCC program have been inspired to themselves donate to this life-changing work. Dr. Griesdale and his wife, Peggy, personally committed to give \$100,000. Additionally, the Intensive Care Unit at VGH has established a philanthropic fund and staff make monthly contributions to support the future of the NCC program.



Linda Nimmerrichter Holmes, a lifelong philanthropist, donated \$25,000 which enabled VGH to purchase the first multimodal neuromonitoring device in Canada, also known as the Brain Bolt.

Linda's generosity provided Drs. Sekhon and Griesdale with the tools to revolutionize traumatic brain injury care at VGH. The use of the Brain Bolt is saving patients who were previously thought "untreatable".

The Brain Bolt first proved its utility in April 2015, when Olympic-hopeful freestyle skier Jamie Crane-Mauzy suffered a traumatic brain injury while competing at Whistler. She was airlifted to VGH and, for the first time in North America, the Brain Bolt was used on a patient — and it worked. Jamie made a full recovery and recently graduated from university.

#### Beyond the brain

Encouraged by early success with the Brain Bolt, the team began to consider other applications for the device.

"Our work with Ryan Jones was a medical first," says Dr. Griesdale. "And I'm proud to say, it is transforming medicine."

Unseasonal snow was thick on the road in May 2016 as 22 year old wildland firefighter Ryan Jones was on his way to a forest fire near Fort St. John. Suddenly his car wheels became stuck and he veered into the oncoming lane. He saw a car approaching and tried to turn, but his car was stuck in the snow — he couldn't turn away.

"The impact of the accident caused Ryan's heart to go into cardiac arrest for 35 minutes. This caused a traumatic injury to his brain due to lack of oxygen," says Dr. Griesdale.

To give Ryan the best chance of recovery, Drs. Sekhon and Griesdale had a revolutionary idea. For the first time in medical history they would use the Brain Bolt on a cardiac arrest patient.

By placing the Brain Bolt device into Ryan's brain, vital second-to-second information was provided including oxygen levels and blood pressure.

"Immediately the team was able to begin healing Ryan's brain," says Dr. Sekhon.

Now fully recovered, Ryan says, "A year ago I didn't think it was going to be possible to go back to firefighting because my body and brain were not in good shape. But now I have a second chance. I'm going to do what I love for my career."

Ryan's parents, Donna and Jim, were so grateful for the care and support their son received that they donated \$10,000 to the NCC program at VGH.

Following Ryan's successful outcome, Dr. Sekhon and his colleagues continue to study the use of the Brain Bolt on cardiac arrest patients. The results are astounding.

"Before Ryan's case, we applied a one-size-fitsall approach to regulating blood pressure in cardiac patients. Well, no more," says Dr. Sekhon. "Personalizing medicine with this technology has the potential to save thousands of lives."

Philanthropy is providing VGH's world-leading experts in neurocritical care with the knowledge and tools they need to save lives that would otherwise be lost.

And this is only the beginning.

# 3T MRI machine: clarity in medicine

We are raising funds to acquire a 3T MRI machine to help meet rising demand for imaging at a much higher level of diagnostic accuracy. The technology will enable our clinicians to detect even the tiniest tissue changes, particularly those in the minute folds of the brain. This will support earlier, more accurate diagnosis and a better prognosis for tumours and many other conditions.

Thanks to the generosity of our donors, including the Segal family, Stephen Sander & family, and guests at the 2018 TELUS Night of a Thousand Stars gala presented by Capital Direct, we are closer to securing this vital equipment.





### Leaders in cancer care

A cancer diagnosis is life changing.

Two in five British Columbians will face the fight against cancer. And it affects families and loved ones too. While progress is being made, nearly a quarter of all cancer patients will lose their life to the disease.

This is why VGH and UBC Hospital are working to transform cancer care.

Breakthroughs and advancements in cancer care are being made at our world-leading research and clinical programs, including the Ovarian Cancer Research (OVCARE) Program and the Vancouver Prostate Centre. These programs, along with others across VCH, have some of the top medical talent and research expertise in Canada working together. They are focused on discovering new ways to diagnose, treat and even prevent the most complex cancers facing British Columbians today.

"If there's one thing better than curing cancer, it's never getting it in the first place," says Dr. Dianne Miller, Co-Founder of OVCARE.

# Personalizing cancer treatment and care

Candy Woodworth was warming up in her Pilates class when she twisted her body and felt a sudden discomfort in her abdomen. The next week in the same class she tried the same twist and it was still uncomfortable, so she made a doctor's appointment.

What she learned would change her life.

"It was ovarian cancer, and it was the most aggressive kind," says Candy. "A tumour was growing and I needed surgery. So I did some research and learned about Dr. Dianne Miller — a world-class surgical oncologist and researcher. And she was right here in Vancouver at VGH."

Dr. Miller led Candy's first surgery. Over the next 18 months, Candy's battle continued as her cancer recurred twice more. But then the OVCARE team made a breakthrough based on their research into new cancer treatments.

Tests of Candy's tumour showed it had a BRCA gene mutation. Dr. Miller and the OVCARE team had successfully treated similar types of cancer with a trial medication. This knowledge fast-tracked Candy into a clinical trial and saved her life. Two and a half years later, Candy remains cancer free. She is a happy and grateful mother and grandmother.

# Inspiring hope through philanthropy

Philanthropy is what drives innovation and advancements in health care that would otherwise not be possible. The impact our donors have is immeasurable and is transforming cancer care, not just in BC, but around the world.

"It is about hope," says Dr. Miller. "When we find new ways to treat cancer like we did with Candy, we provide another avenue of recovery. The OVCARE team's goal is to decrease cancer mortality from all gynecological cancers by 50 per cent in 20 years. And with the continued hard work of our team and philanthropic support, we know that this is realistic."

Philanthropists Rudy and Patricia North believe in Dr. Miller's vision and have donated \$2.5 million to support the OVCARE research team.

"We're not patients, we're just givers," says Patricia. "We give to OVCARE to help fund the best research which we believe will lead to a cure."

Together, we can make a difference for all British Columbians impacted by cancer.

#### Bringing top talent to BC


With philanthropic support, we are recruiting world-leading experts for key roles that will have lasting impact on cancer research and treatment in BC.

A transformational \$18 million gift from Aqueduct Foundation on behalf of an anonymous donor helped bring precision medicine expert, Dr. Sriram Subramaniam, to Vancouver. He will design precise, targeted and cost-effective cancer treatments working in partnership with the Vancouver Prostate Centre at VGH, UBC, the Djavad Mowafaghian Centre for Brain Health and other research centres.

"I am honoured to have been appointed the Gobind Khorana Canada Excellence Research Chair in Precision Cancer Drug Design. Our work has the potential to establish VGH, UBC and Canada at the forefront of the emerging era of precision medicine and bring about transformative discoveries in cancer, neuroscience and infectious disease," says Dr. Subramaniam.

Also through philanthropic funding, the Dr. Patricia Clugston Chair in Breast Reconstruction has been established. Plastic Surgeon Dr. Kathryn Isaac — one of the up-and-coming surgical talents who joined VCH in recent years — has been appointed to the role. In addition to performing breast reconstruction at VGH and UBC Hospital, Dr. Isaac will be a champion for all aspects of breast cancer care.

Dr. Isaac has joined forces with her equally talented colleagues, Drs. Sheina Macadam and Andrea MacNeill, in their ambitious project to revolutionize the breast cancer patient journey. This crucial work will be supported by a gift from Jim and Yvette Philip, who were inspired by the breast cancer journey of their own daughter, Jennifer.




patients make a LEAP

Generous philanthropists Della and Stuart McLaughlin are supporting the creation of the Rapid Access Lung Evaluation & Assessment Program (LEAP).

"LEAP will enable us to work together to diagnose and treat suspected lung cancer patients more effectively," says Dr. John Yee, Head of Thoracic Surgery at VGH and UBC Hospital. "This will save lives."

The goals of LEAP are to shorten the diagnostic process for patients suspected of having lung cancer, and improve their overall experience from diagnosis through to treatment and, if needed, palliative care.





# Pushing the boundaries of cardiac care

One weekday morning Simon Smith drove to work, parked his car and walked up the stairs to his office. He had no idea that in just a few hours he would be fighting for his life.

"I remember going up the stairs and feeling winded, and it was only two flights," says Simon.

Although his shortness of breath went away, his throat felt uncomfortable. So, he called his wife, Dr. Raewyn Broady who works at VGH. She advised him to get medical attention right away. Simon went straight to the VGH Emergency Room where he exchanged texts with his wife, telling her he was doing OK.

A few minutes later Dr. Broady got a call from ER staff saying, I'm really sorry to tell you this, but your husband has gone into cardiac arrest and we haven't been able to resuscitate him.

She hung up and rushed down to the ER.

#### Life-saving technology

When Dr. Broady arrived, the medical team told her that Simon's best chance of surviving was to use a portable heart-lung machine called ECMO. This life-saving technology allows the heart and lungs to recover, and keeps organs functioning while medical teams continue their work.

Within 10 minutes of his cardiac arrest Simon was in a catheterization laboratory at VGH where ECMO was initiated and blood-flow to his heart was restored. Two days later Simon's heart was beating on its own. ECMO and the teams of medical experts at VGH had saved his life.

"The secret to saving lives is a high functioning team that can provide a coordinated and critical level of care," says Dr. Don Griesdale, the critical care medicine physician who along with the medical team made the request for ECMO. "Simon is alive today because of expert collaboration between ICU, Cardiovascular Surgery, Cardiology and Emergency Medicine."













VGH's Cardiology team is pushing the boundaries of medicine, driving vital research and ensuring patients receive the care they deserve in their time of need.

"It is my privilege to be able to contribute to a cause that has deeply affected my life. My father passed away from heart disease, and I want to give the medical teams at VGH the equipment, tools and resources they need to best help patients like him in the future."

## **Community impact**

#### Speaking up for end-of-life care

Palliative care can be a difficult thing to talk about. Securing funding for research and program development can be challenging too.

Palliative care provides medical services, emotional support and spiritual resources for people who have terminal illnesses and are in their final stages of life.

Robert's generosity is supporting these patients

through the innovative "Integrating a Palliative Approach by having Conversations Early" (iPACE) model.

"End-of-life is a reality for every human being. We are often shy to address this openly, and need to take the time to listen to patients and their families," says Robert. "The iPACE program is an important and integral part of my vision that by investing in people and giving them the knowledge, tools and support they need, we can make significant changes in people's lives and their well-being — physically, mentally and spiritually."

Through the hiring of palliative care specialist "champions" across VCH, we are improving palliative care both at home and in residential care settings. Combined with other improvements such as more hospice capacity, VCH is making the end-of-life experience more meaningful for patients and their families.

#### A warmer welcome

In August 2018, we celebrated the opening of the new Psychiatric Assessment Unit (PAU) at VGH.

The PAU is a main entry point for mental health clients entering the health care system and is a gateway to them receiving the support they need. The PAU renovation was designed around the three core elements of psychiatric care — safety, respect and comfort. The larger, brighter and safe space is supporting their comfort and care.

We are incredibly grateful to our donors, including Wai Mo Wong & Family, who provided the funds to rejuvenate the space.




# Liquid skin substitute for burns and wounds

# Innovations from hospital to home

TEC4Home is an innovative program helping patients to safely transition from hospital to home. Partly funded through philanthropy, and with the help of TELUS Health, TEC4Home installs novel technology in a patient's home that can monitor details of their health such as blood pressure and blood oxygen levels.

"It is really beneficial, because it gets patients into a pattern of checking their own health," says Pegga de Albreit, a member of TEC4Home Patient Advisory Committee. "Every day patients can check their blood pressure, weigh themselves and measure blood oxygen levels. And they don't have to go into the hospital for that."

TEC4Home is reducing the need for Emergency Room visits, unnecessary hospitalizations and improving overall quality of life for patients.

Emergency Medicine specialist Dr. Kendall Ho is planning expansions of TEC4Home to help more patients across the province.

# Leaving a legacy, making a lasting impact

Jab Sidhoo was just six years old when he arrived in BC from British-ruled India in 1929.

From an early age Jab witnessed the fight for equal rights. Whether it was his father's struggle for fair and equitable treatment, or watching family friends — a pair of sisters, Sarjit and Jagdis Siddoo — become the first Canadian-born doctors of Indian descent. These progressive moments would play an important role in shaping the charitable man Jab would become.

#### A lion of his community

Jab loved Vancouver: the city and the people. Jab was one of the 100 founding members of the BC Lions, providing funding to help push the team to their elite status today.

"He never missed a game," says Asha, Jab's daughter. "People would phone my mom and ask for invitations to come over and she would say, I have to check if there's a game on that day."

Jab was also a loyal supporter of health care. In 1998, he became a donor to VGH & UBC Hospital Foundation. He also established the Ajaib (Jab) and Nirmal (Munni) Sidhoo Charities Endowment Fund, which provides funding to young researchers at Vancouver Coastal Health Research Institute (VCHRI) to study urology and diabetes. And when he passed away, Jab left a generous gift of securities to our Foundation in his will.

"He would look at money like a pie, and he made sure there was always a piece leftover for people who weren't eating," says Ravi. "That was dad."

#### A million dollar dream

In 2008, cancer patient Chad Warren pledged to raise \$1 million for the Hematology Research Program at VGH to support advances in blood disease research and treatments.

Sadly, Chad wouldn't live to see his dream fulfilled. When he passed in 2009, Chad's family continued his fundraising pledge in his honour.

Ten years later, in the fall of 2018, Chad's father Clark stood in disbelief inside the tennis club Chad called home. After a decade, their family had finally fulfilled their promise — the Chad Warren Charity Challenge had officially raised \$1,070,000.

"Family and close friends of Chad's were all there. There was cheering and clapping and we had confetti flying. If Chad could have been there, I know he would say, *This is totally awesome!*" says Clark Warren, Chad's father.









Now in its 17<sup>th</sup> year, the Coast Capital Savings Charity Golf Tournament raised a record-breaking \$300,000, bringing the total raised by this annual event to over \$2.8 million to support mental health initiatives.



The Sing Tao Daily 35<sup>th</sup> Anniversary Celebration Charity Gala raised over \$176,000 to help transform health care for all British Columbians and support our hospitals' Geriatric Health Program.



The Miss Chinese Vancouver Pageant 2018 generously named the Foundation as the beneficiary this year, helping raise \$568,880 for a new surgical navigation system and a new waiting space at the Eye Care Centre.

# Small gifts, big impact




